- Renewed focus on Development and Donors Services activities to expand CFWC's endowment and to nurture relationships with donor families and their advisors; and
- The provision of community leadership and convening initiatives targeting donor education, nonprofit partner skill building and of course, fundraising.

**CFWC AND THE PITTSBURGH FOUNDATION:
CREATING ORGANIZATIONAL
EFFECTIVENESS**

When the Community Foundation of Westmoreland County (CFWC) merged with The Pittsburgh Foundation in 2010, the immediate and tangible benefits for the region were clear. A year later, the more far-reaching success of the move is being realized and hailed as an effective model for other nonprofits in organizational effectiveness strategy.

“The Community Foundation Board of Directors in Westmoreland County stepped out on the edge and, supported by The Pittsburgh Foundation, did what few organizations would consider doing, we merged!” says Regis Synan, Chairman of the Board of CFWC.

“Our county is now benefitting from this partnership and the tremendous synergies related to shared services, world class products and expertise,” he continues. “We now believe our experience can be effectively positioned to encourage other nonprofit organizations, regionally and nationally, to consider this model for improved sustainability and mission performance.”

Bringing the two foundations together has strengthened CFWC’s grantmaking impact in several ways. In addition to offering enhanced services for donors, the merger has reduced administrative costs and allowed the Foundation to do what it does best, focus on legacy relationship building, asset development and expand its grantmaking in Westmoreland County.

“This has been a terrific win for the region,” adds Mr. Synan. “By merging, we’ve lessened our expenses and put dollars where they belong, on the streets where the community needs them the most. That is our goal and our mission.”

The merger has also enabled CFWC to build a stronger platform for convening and legacy development, says Kirk Utzinger, Executive Director.

“Our Board and staff are spending more time discussing community and asset development rather than non-productive but required back office issues,” he says. “The Pittsburgh Foundation is one of the best run community foundations in the country and they continue to evaluate and upgrade their internal functions. By CFWC folding into their internal platforms, we become state-of-the-art, allowing our team to get out into the community and build relationships in Westmoreland County.”

CFWC, with assets totaling more than \$17 million, awarded \$1.1 million to 210 nonprofits during fiscal year 2010. Now converted to a calendar year in line with the The Pittsburgh Foundation reporting period, CFWC is on track to exceed both grantmaking and contribution levels in 2011. It should be noted that in addition to The Pittsburgh Foundation, The Richard King Mellon Foundation and The Benedum Foundation are important foundation investors in the merger and CFWC grantmaking in 2011.

In addition to decreasing operational overhead and utilizing The Pittsburgh Foundation’s world-class technology platform, CFWC benefitted from the rollout of WestmorelandGives Day of Giving, which brought in an additional \$300,000 to 71 Westmoreland County nonprofit organizations this year.

With an eye on legacy development, CFWC has been successful in securing an excess of \$10 million in future gifts to Westmoreland County in the first year of the merger.

“We’ve basically plugged CFWC operations into The Pittsburgh Foundation machine in the area of communications, marketing, technology, fund development, programs and finance,” adds Mr. Utzinger. “Overall it gives a small community foundation an opportunity to be sustainable, service oriented and develop to our full potential.”

“We’re appreciative to The Pittsburgh Foundation, Grant Oliphant’s leadership and the entire professional staff for their kindness and expertise,” says Ms. Barbara Ferrier, a CFWC donor through the Ferrier Foundation Legacy Fund. “We’ve uncovered more benefits than we ever anticipated on the front end of this merger with the expectation for greater accomplishment and service to the region in the years to come.”

OUR DONORS

GREENSBURG FOUNDATION FUND

Established in 1946, the Greensburg Foundation was established as a legacy trust by prominent local families to benefit the Greensburg community, supporting programs in the areas of human services, education, families and children. Today, those initial assets are valued at \$4.6 million.

The fund is managed by an appointed seven-member Advisory Committee who serve staggered terms of seven years each. Advisory members are appointed by county government, corporate and civic officials, as named within the trust, on a seven-year rotating basis.

In March of 2011, the Greensburg Foundation awarded more than \$140,000 in grants to 24 organizations within its area of giving, generally defined as Greensburg, Pennsylvania, 15601.

“This year was a tough year for the fund,” says Les Harvey, an Advisory Board member who is in the final year of his seven-year term. “Money is just getting tighter and tighter. Now that The Pittsburgh Foundation and the Greensburg Fund are working together, we should be able to do bigger and better things, but it will still depend on investment returns and the economy.”

Mr. Harvey says he’s particularly proud of the Board’s diligence in stretching the dollars to meet the needs of so

many local community nonprofit organizations. He is especially proud of the work done by the Make-A-Wish Foundation in serving the needs of families in the Greensburg area to make special wishes come true for children with life-threatening illnesses.

“Being a part of the Greensburg Foundation Advisory Committee has been a great experience, the fastest seven years of my community service life,” says Mr. Harvey.

“I would highly recommend it. It’s educational, enjoyable and to play a small part in carrying out the legacies of past generations of Greensburg philanthropists is an honor.”

The Greensburg Foundation merged with the Community Foundation of Westmoreland County in 1995, and forms part of the yearly grantmaking for the combined organizations, which last year totaled \$1.2 million. The Greensburg Foundation has awarded more than \$5 million to nonprofit organizations since its inception in 1946.

THE FERRIER FAMILY LEGACY FUND

Barbara Ferrier is passionate about the Ferrier Family Legacy Fund and the good work it is doing in Westmoreland County. A life-long educator who has taught at every level—elementary, secondary and post secondary schools—Ms. Ferrier has a keen sense of the projects she chooses to support, many of them promoting innovations in learning that expand opportunities for women, children, families and the arts.

Growing up in Erie, Ms. Ferrier's civic-minded parents taught her the importance of giving back to the community, she explains. "Those who have been blessed need to give back. I want to make sure that I leave a legacy into the future."

Ms. Ferrier created The Ferrier Family Legacy Fund in the March of 2010 through the Community Foundation of Westmoreland County, a \$150,000 fund that is as diverse as her own varied interests. The fund supports a plethora of organizations that include: The Blackburn Center, Parent-WISE, Rotary, Women's Leadership Council of the United Way, the YWCA, Citizens Advisory Council for Westmoreland County Parks (CAB), First Presbyterian Church of Greensburg, The Westmoreland Museum of American Art, The Pittsburgh Ballet activities in Westmoreland County, and Greensburg/Hempfield Library.

Ms. Ferrier is personally active in many of the organizations that she supports. She is particularly proud of a collaboration that she pioneered with the Pittsburgh Ballet

Theatre, the Westmoreland Museum of American Art and the Hempfield School District. The program introduces fourth grade students at Stanwood Elementary to art in a whole new context, helping them to see the connections not only between art, dance and music but incorporating math, science and communication skills into the physical form.

"At Google and Apple, they have creative play areas where employees can do things," Ms. Ferrier explains. "This program is giving students the opportunity to break out of a limited structure while thinking and generating creative ideas. It's important that they learn there's not only one right answer."

"There are lots of ways people can make a significant difference in our community," she adds. "Working through the Community Foundation of Westmoreland County, an affiliate of The Pittsburgh Foundation, enables us to leverage our community and make Westmoreland County a fantastic place to live. The sky's the limit."

CHAD DELIER SCANLON MEMORIAL FUND

Chad Scanlon's life was filled with faith and a love for learning about the world around him. It was also far too short. At the age of 11, Chad was diagnosed with a glioblastoma, a rare and often fatal brain cancer with a 5 percent rate of survival.

In the months following his diagnosis, Chad and his family were surrounded by a supportive community of friends and families who offered prayers, food and support. Soldiers in Afghanistan sent gifts and cards so Chad could give his mother, dad and sister presents at Christmastime. Postcards arrived from around the world, including notes from President Bush, the Pope and the King of Belgium.

After a ten-month battle, Chad passed away in May of 2007; he was 12.

"Chad had a very deep faith ever since he was little," says his mother Marie-Paule Scanlon. "He was different in the sense that he never cared about fitting in; he was who he was. He loved jumping rope. He loved learning. He played the violin and appreciated all kinds of music."

"Win or lose, you have to have faith" adds Jim Scanlon, his father. "Chad made a huge impact on people. His faith and belief were amazing."

As a way to give back to the community for the support they received during Chad's illness, the Scanlons created the Chad Delier Scanlon Memorial Fund through the Community Foundation of Westmoreland County (CFWC) in 2007. The fund provides grants to support other families and their children who are suffering with life-threatening illnesses and research grants in the hope that a cure may one day be found.

Last year the Scanlons worked with Richard Kozar on a book about Chad's life. "The Book of Chad," released last fall, is available on-line and proceeds benefit the fund.

"Through all this we learned so many lessons that we wanted to share with the whole world, says Mrs. Scanlon. "If we can share Chad's story, and help other people, we somehow keep his memory alive and Chad didn't die in vain."

WESTMORELAND INTERMEDIATE
UNIT HORSE THERAPY

For the autistic child, verbal communication, socialization and core strength are a challenge that requires daily work and therapy. But introduce a horse to the child, and the struggle is transformed into a source of joy.

Research is revealing what a growing number of autistic therapists and parents have come to know: Autistic children are able to form a bond with horses that helps and inspires them therapeutically in the areas of cognition, communication and motivation. While most of the research to date focuses on children between the ages of five and 12, a new program offered through the Westmoreland Intermediate Unit (WIU) is taking it one step further, giving children ages three to five an opportunity to engage in equine therapy.

“These are kids who often don’t speak at all in class or to their parents, yet when they get on a horse, they are able to give commands,” says Gregg Kretchun, Grant Administrator and Coordinator of the WIU Foundation. “Children with autism relate to the horses, function better and are more receptive to therapy when they’re with them. The results are amazing.”

The program was initiated by a WIU teacher using a \$500 grant from the WIU Foundation. The first-year results were so phenomenal, the WIU applied for a larger grant through the Now and Forever Fund of the Community Foundation of Westmoreland County (CFWC) in 2010. The \$8,930 grant enabled two classes of eight children to participate this year.

The children learn to ride and care for horses at a local non-profit therapeutic riding center, Nickers ‘n Neighs in Donegal Township, which provides services to people with a range of disabilities. It’s thrilling to watch the children light up when you say the word “horse,” says therapist Kiersten Shevchik.

“It’s hard to find an activity for a child with autism that helps them to focus,” Ms. Shevchik adds. “It’s really neat to see them with the horse, giving them hugs and kisses, which they don’t do with people.”

The Greensburg-based WIU hopes to further expand the program and develop it as a therapy model for other area organizations. “We intend to conduct our own research to see what (age) levels will benefit the most,” says Mr. Kretchun. “With the right support, we think this can go a long way.”

Applying for a Grant

In partnership with nonprofit organizations the Westmoreland Now & Forever Fund, which awards unrestricted grants to meet community needs, seeks to impact our county through targeted and inclusive grantmaking. Our ‘Healthy Communities’ grantmaking platforms focus on the following five areas:

New Ventures

To support collaborative efforts between nonprofit organizations to eradicate duplication of service, improve efficiencies and, support merger and consolidation efforts.

Community Partners

To support the mission of sector leading nonprofit organizations through unrestricted grantmaking support.

Capacity Builders

By supporting nonprofit organizations who require funding to advance their mission through investment in people and/or infrastructure.

Project Support

To assist nonprofits who seek funding for one time projects that will positively impact Westmoreland County.

Community Response Grants

To provide support to nonprofits who have emergent and immediate needs.



HOW TO APPLY

A rolling application process that began January 1, 2011 is now in effect. After carefully considering the above grantmaking platforms direct a letter of inquiry which includes a brief statement about your organization, your proposed program or project, its intended outcomes and a draft budget/cost analysis. You will be notified by email once your inquiry has been received.

Upon receipt a CFWC staff member will contact your organization to discuss your proposal in detail, gather more information and determine if your inquiry merits funding. Your organization will either be selected to submit a formal proposal, or will be provided with feedback and direction for future funding opportunities.

Organizations submitting formal proposals will generally be asked to meet with Program staff/Grantmaking Committee members. Site visits will be conducted where necessary.

The Grantmaking Committee will meet quarterly to make final decisions on all formal grant applications.

WHO CAN APPLY

Any nonprofit organization with a 501 (c)(3) status located in Westmoreland County is eligible to submit a letter of inquiry. (While preference and priority will be given to nonprofit organizations located within Westmoreland County, consideration may be given to organizations located in contiguous counties that can demonstrate significant services to Westmoreland County residents).

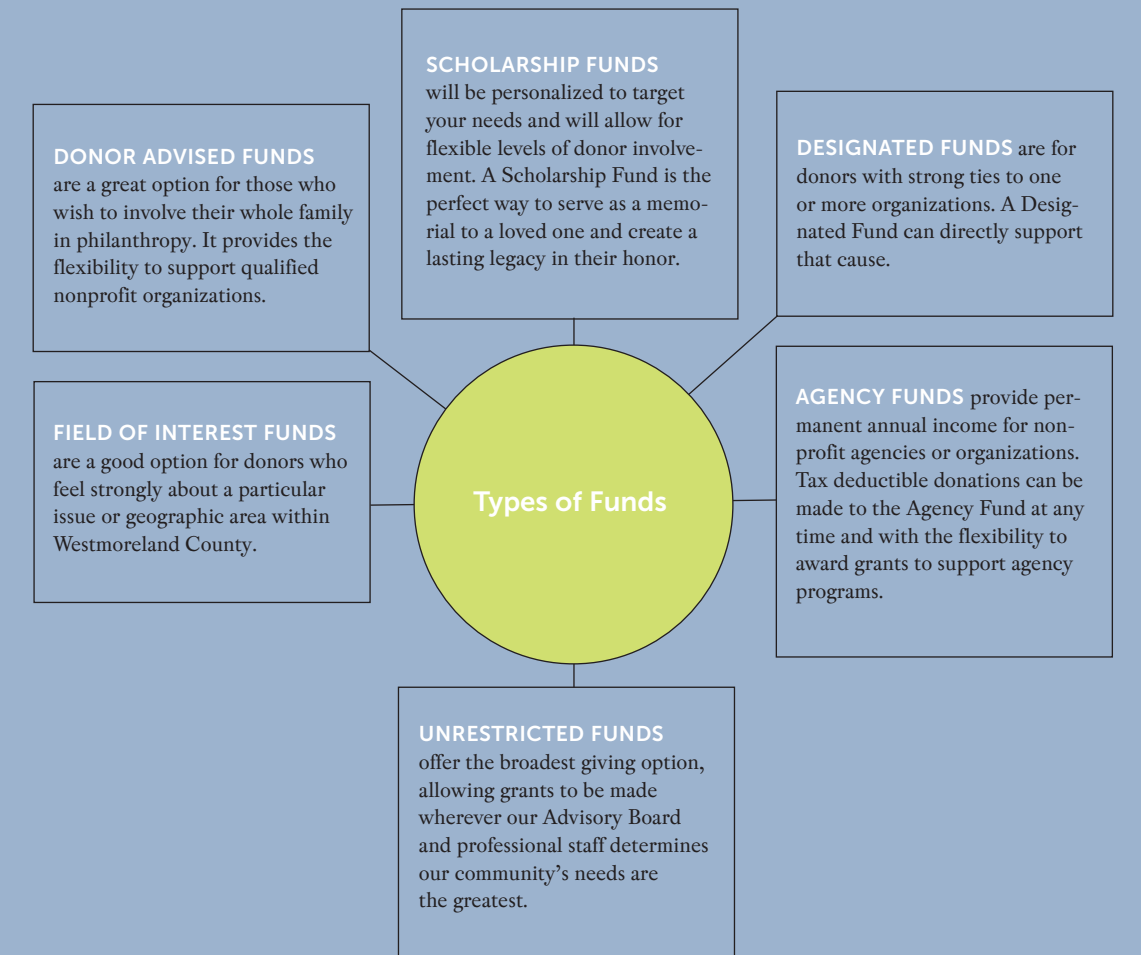
The Westmoreland Now & Forever Fund does not generally award grants for general operating purposes, sectarian purposes, private or parochial schools, individual public schools, individual hospitals, organizations that address individual diseases, capital campaigns, special events, scholarships or internships.

Establishing a Fund

Since 1995, the Community Foundation of Westmoreland County has been connecting its generous donors with the critical needs of our community. Donors who have established funds through the Foundation can support virtually any area of charitable interest in Westmoreland County, or across the United States. Because the Foundation is a public charity, donors benefit from significant tax advantages.

Endowment funds held at the Foundation and created by individuals and organizations exist in perpetuity, growing each year, to provide an ever increasing resource to benefit the community. In 2010, the Foundation provided more than \$1.1 million in grants to a vast array of nonprofit organizations based on donor interest and the specific purposes of individual funds.

The development and donor services staff of the Community Foundation of Westmoreland County have the experience and expertise to assist donors in establishing funds and to structure each fund to realize the important tax savings that result from charitable giving. Our experienced grantmaking staff has broad knowledge and understanding of community needs and can assist donors in ensuring that their charitable goals are met.

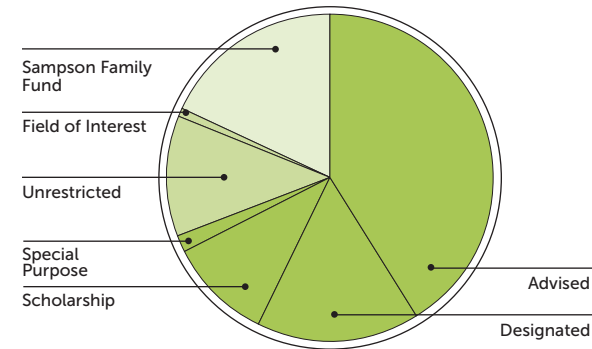

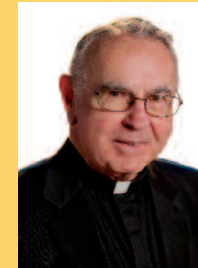
