 The McKeesport Community Fund of The Pittsburgh Foundation was established in 2017 by Trulieve as part of Trulieve's commitment to fostering the well-being of the community and giving a portion of revenue back to the community to support revitalization.

McKeesport Community Fund Mission

The McKeesport Community Fund will provide monetary resources to support public 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations that are located in McKeesport and/or serve 70% of McKeesport residents, that focus on:

- Education and job training.
- At-risk and special needs youth.
- Anti-violence initiatives.
- Expungement programs.
- Projects to improve infrastructure.
- Removing blight.

- Affordable housing.
- Local entrepreneurship.
- Economic development.
- Drug treatment and sober living.
- Support services focused on the qualifying conditions under Act 16 and healthcare assistance.







Criteria



Criteria for eligibility

- Must have a current public 501(c)(3) status. Entities without a 501(c)(3) status can contact belonusk@pghfdn.org for assistance locating a potential fiscal sponsor.
- Only one request can be submitted per organization.
- Funding amount may be between \$5,000 to \$15,000.
- Full funding is not guaranteed.
- Organization must be located in and serving the McKeesport community or provide at least 70% of services to McKeesport residents and its environs (zip codes 15132 or 15134).

Fiscal Sponsorships

The Pittsburgh Foundation can only pay grants to registered 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations (including churches) or to a public entity such as a municipality, public school or state agency. All others will need to use a fiscal sponsor.

- Fiscal sponsorship is a relationship in which an unincorporated group or project seeking to carry out charitable activities affiliates with an existing 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that shares a compatible mission.
- The most common model, "preapproved grant relationship," involves the fiscal sponsor receiving and managing funds on behalf of the project.

Fiscal Sponsorships

Examples of acceptable fiscal sponsorship organizations

- 501(c)(3) nonprofits.
 - New Sun Rising.
 - The Pittsburgh Contingency.
 - · POISE.
 - Pittsburgh Filmmakers/Pittsburgh Center for the Arts.
- Churches.

Examples of unacceptable fiscal sponsorship organizations

- For-profit organizations.
- Private foundations.
- Fraternal beneficiary societies.
 (Elks, Wolves, Rotary)
- Business leagues, etc.
- Social and recreation clubs.

Criteria for eligibility

- Grants may support events or small capital projects that support
 the mission of the Fund. Examples of capital needs include
 building materials, technology or recreational equipment,
 appliances, and/or the labor needed for the improvements.
- Grants may also support a project that supports the mission of the nonprofit or the fund, including piloting new services, expanding an existing service, or fulfilling a temporary need that has a timed beginning and end.

Foundation-directed grantmaking



• Foundation-directed grants are funds that are directed by the Foundation and its Program department.

This includes the Foundation's traditional grant process and some of its special initiatives.

Donor-directed grantmaking



- **Donor-directed** grants are influenced by the advisors on donor funds, such as donor-advised funds.
 - You cannot solicit donor-directed funding.
- The McKeesport Community Fund is a donor-directed grant process and does **not** interfere with foundation-directed grantmaking opportunities.
